

Annual Review: 2009

2009 was a very tough year for the whole planet from social, economic and political points-of-view and, of course, the biophysical component of the planet also took many severe knocks. The fact that the Climate Change Conference in Copenhagen was largely unsuccessful and inconclusive is an indication of “how high” the stakes are and compromises are extremely difficult to achieve. In the midst of all these uncertainties, an NGO such as Delta Environmental Centre (DEC) has faced several challenges in 2009. Some examples are possible projects being postponed or cancelled altogether, delays (quite lengthy in some cases) in payments/commitments being made, sudden staff changes within partner organisations, frequently being asked to do “more” for “less” and constantly searching for new partnerships and potential funders/supporters.

As a result DEC has had to operate in a very “Spartan” way, always attempting to maximise the use of the resources at our disposal. The Directors and staff are thanked for their co-operation in this regard. DEC received a 100% B-B BEE Beneficiary Analysis Rating from EMPOWERDEX which will stand us in good stead for current funders, potential funders and tendering processes and their Socio-Economic Development scorecard requirements.

DEC has also entered into a Partnership Agreement with the Gauteng Dept. of Education, linked to the Lottery Project based in the Gauteng West (Krugersdorp) District. The Lease with the Joburg Property Company (JPC) has been signed by the Chairman, Don Macey, and submitted to JPC for their signatures. The signed document has not yet been returned to DEC.

Delta Park has been selected for “World Class” Park status by Joburg City Parks (JCP) which is very good news for the sustainability of this precious open space/green belt in Johannesburg. JCP has installed a bright and cheerful children’s play area that is proving to be extremely popular with family groups. It offers a peotential source of “ad hoc” visitors to the Centre.

2009 saw the roll-out of the accredited training programmes (Diploma and selected Short Courses) in Gauteng, North West, N. Cape and KZN provinces. DEC believes that having received accreditation as a training provider from the ETDP-SETA and having an accredited Diploma qualification will make a significant contribution to DEC’s sustainability.

1. GOVERNANCE, ACCOUNTABILITY and FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

Delta Environmental Centre (DEC) is governed by an honorary Board of Directors, chaired by Mr. Don Macey.

The Directors have met the obligations contained in the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the organisation. They have had four meetings (that were legitimately constituted) on 20 February, 15 May, 11 September and 20 November 2009. An Annual General Meeting was held on Friday 11 September 2009.

DEC has submitted all the necessary documentation that is required on a regular basis to the relevant government departments linked to the following:

- Section 21 Company registration;
- Non-Profit Organisation registration;
- Public Benefit Organisation registration;
- VAT registration;
- Skills Development Levy contribution;
- Occupational contribution;
- PAYE contributions; and
- UIF contributions.

DEC has a Budget that is prepared on an annual basis and up-dated financial reports are presented to the Directors at each of their meetings to reflect income and expenditure. Noticeable variances are discussed at these meetings and suggestions/solutions are put forward to the Executive Officer. Every effort is made to curb expenses and manage project funds as cautiously as possible.

DEC's Audited Financial Statements were tabled and approved at the AGM on 11 September 2009. The audit period was 1 April 2008 to 31 March 2009. Our auditor, Peter Watson, was thanked for preparing the statements and his firm, Tannenbaum and Watson, was re-appointed by the Directors as DEC's auditors.

Two of DEC's Directors release the salary payments by EFT on a monthly basis. Di Beeton and Shanu Misser are also authorised to release all other payments as and when required. Estee Barends, DEC's Book-keeper, is responsible for managing all the income and expenditure processes within the organisation. Section 18A Receipts are issued to donors for their income tax records.

DEC banks with the Standard Bank and is currently running three cheque accounts for

1. Main DEC business;
2. the "Lottery" project; and
3. Debit Card expenses (used by staff for trips away from DEC)

DEC also has an investment account with Personal Trust International based in Cape Town in order to derive benefit from interest on accumulated funds whilst projects are underway.

DEC submits Reports (Narrative and Financial) to all funders/sponsors according to the conditions contained in the agreements or contracts at all times. Regular contact is kept with funders/sponsors via e-mail, post or telephone throughout the year.

All required Policies are in place to address staff issues, financial and administration matters, resource management e.g. water, energy, waste and stationery and safety and health.

Daleen Stellman at Reception is responsible for a "petty cash" account that is used for incidental day-to-day expenses.

2. RESOURCE USE

Water

Monthly tests of DEC's tap water are conducted and reports are submitted by Rand Water. There are no areas of concern in this regard.

The water meter for DEC is read on a monthly basis and the use is recorded in m³. Water is used wisely within the building and the average consumption is 71m³ (71 000 litres of water per month). Consumption has been reduced considerably during the past year –from (83m³ p.m.)!

Energy

Various practices have been put in place to conserve energy and to use electricity wisely. DEC contracted Energy Management SA to audit DEC's electricity consumption because we are supplied with 3-Phase electricity (measured in kilovolts) and this was proving exorbitant. Following on from a request to City Power, DEC's tariff has been downscaled to that of a "Business Power User" and the reduction in monthly charges is significant (approximately 50%)!

Waste

DEC has a Recycling Drop-off area adjacent to the Car Park that is well-supported by the local residents and DEC's staff and programme participants. Paper/cardboard, glass and cans are collected and plastics were collected until October 2009. New timber-plastic receptacles for the collection of plastics have been ordered, through the efforts of the Recycling Action Group, and should be installed by February 2010.

This area is frequently used as a teaching aid for groups (school groups, teachers, youth groups etc.), in conjunction with the Recycling exhibit in the Centre, funded by the National Recycling Forum!

3. STAFF DEVELOPMENT AND CAPACITY BUILDING

Regular staff meetings have been held throughout the year: 8 January, 2 February, 2 March, 11 May, 1 June, 13 July, 11 August, 7 September, 5 October, 9 November, 7 December 2009.

Staff training sessions have been offered by both DEC and Rand Water on the following topics:

May - Introduced "Wild Animals in Towns and Cities" Grade 5 programme and trained staff how to use the activities.

June - Grade 11 Life Sciences "Environmental Studies" programme introduced and trained.

July – DEC puppet training.

October - Grade 10 "Biodiversity to Eco-systems and Classification" programme introduced and trained.

November - WWET training including puppet show, teambuilding activities, Water Wise workshops (road-shows).

We make every effort to ensure that the staff are up-to-date and well-informed at all times. Several staff attended a 3-day training session on "Evaluating an Environmental Education programme" in October that was facilitated by Presha Ramsarup and Solly Mosidi. All the participants found it challenging and stimulating.

Throughout the year, the relationships with various government departments (national/provincial/local) have been further developed and excellent co-operation and collaboration has been maintained.

DEC facilitators were also contracted to conduct training for Inclusive Education programmes in KZNatal in April and July 2009.

Shanu Misser has completed the first year of her M.Ed. Course at Rhodes University, having written exams in early December 2009. We wish her every success with her studies. She has to complete her research in 2010.

4. PARTNERSHIPS

Rand Water

DEC's partnership with Rand Water's Water Wise Education Team continues to be governed by a Service Agreement (SLA). Rand Water has had a full complement of staff (4) at DEC for the whole year. They are Samanta Stelli, Paul Lawrence, Magdaline Motsumi and Valerie Vermeulen. The team has had an extremely busy year and continues to offer a range of educational workshops that encourage participants to be "Water Wise".

It is encouraging to note that all the water-saving devices that have been installed, have resulted in a noticeable drop in DEC's water consumption. All the visitors to DEC continue to be impressed with the water wise messages that are displayed prominently in the building.

Rand Water's Horticulture Section continues to support the maintenance and development of the Water Wise Garden adjacent to the main car park. This area is well-used by all visiting groups as it illustrates all the important water wise gardening principles. Megan Taylor and Robin Sam are very committed and helpful. During 2009 they were assisted by Ms. Rahmat Shaik.

We are very grateful for Rand Water's creative, environmentally attractive re-decoration of Delta's bathrooms.

The team based at DEC has been fortunate to have a new MAZDA BT50 bakkie assigned to them, through DEC, for travelling to present programmes and workshops across the length and breadth of Gauteng.

Gauteng Dept. of Education (GDE)

DEC entered into a Partnership Agreement with the GDE linked to the "Greening the Curriculum" project funded by the National Lotteries Distribution Trust Fund. Ten schools in the Gauteng West District (greater Krugersdorp area) have been selected by the GDE officials.

This project runs for 2 years.

Mazda Wildlife Fund

DEC has two vehicles – a Mazda 323 Sting and a Mazda B160 bakkie – that were originally assigned to DEC by the Mazda Wildlife Fund. DEC truly appreciates the Mazda Wildlife Fund's kind

gesture of donating the 323 to the organisation. The vehicle is used extensively for travelling to workshops, not only in Gauteng but further afield e.g. Limpopo and Mpumalanga. Both of these vehicles continue to give good service despite the rigours of being driven on poorly maintained roads in many areas.

The brand new bakkie assigned to Rand Water (a twin-cab vehicle) has made travelling much more comfortable for the team. A very pleasant “hand-over” function was held on 27 May 2009 at DEC. The long-standing partnership with the Mazda Wildlife Fund is much appreciated by all concerned. Mr. Humphrey le Grice keeps in regular contact with DEC and is always encouraging us to “keep up the good work”.

EnviroTeach

DEC has continued to work on the Old Mutual “On the Money” programme during the course of 2009. The Senior Phase Kits are well on the way to being complete and the Foundation Phase kits are in the developmental stage. The Kits are attractive, innovative and encourage interactive group work in an attempt to make learners “money wise”.

An edition of EnviroTeach on “Natural Resources and our Environment” was published in October 2009 and has been well-received. This edition was funded by the Hans Hoheisen Charitable Trust, Dept. of Environmental Affairs, Afrisam, City of Cape Town, SANParks and SASOL Ltd. The content is aimed at Gd 8 Social Sciences (Geography) educators.

5. SUPPORT FOR SCHOOL/COMMUNITY ACTION PROJECTS

As part of the DANIDA-funded Urban Environmental Management Programme (UEMP), an “Energy” Room was established at Thorisong Primary School in the Govan Mbeki Municipality (Secunda, Mpumalanga). An official opening was held at the School with the support of SASOL Ltd, ESKOM, the provincial Depts. of Education and Agriculture and DEC on 23 September 2009. The murals in the Room depict the process of generating electricity from coal, the transmission of electricity ultimately to our homes and various energy-saving measures that can be practiced in different environments. A resource pack of activities for Grades 1-7 that will help teachers to teach “Energy” in a more creative and interactive way was developed by DEC. SASOL Ltd and ESKOM must be thanked for their additional support for this project. Presha Ramsarup, Jana Cauldwell, Evelyn Molefe and Mr. Linda Masilela, very ably supported by Mercia Mitchell and Neil Ross of the Govan Mbeki Municipality (Horticultural Section), must be thanked for their fortitude and dedication to this project.

The Environmental Committees from Ntokozweni Primary School and Phelang School (Special Needs) in Kwa Thema, Ekurhuleni approached DEC to offer a training session at DEC to build their capacity around “Energy”, “Waste” and “Food Gardening”. The schools contracted DEC to offer this training on a Friday afternoon/evening and a full Saturday on 14 and 15 August 2009. It was an action-packed programme that covered all the elements that the Committees had requested. The school paid DEC for the training from their “Bontle ke Botho/Clean and Green” Campaign prize-money. This is a 1st for DEC! Both schools are also registered as Eco-Schools and continue to engage in creative, dynamic “action” projects.

A teacher participating in the accredited Short Course training in the N.W. province, Mr. Masibi at Bophharima High School embarked on developing an innovative learning programme on “Climate Change” as a response to completing his Portfolio of Evidence. This training is funded by AfriSam. Mr. Ngobese at Gadeleni Intermediate School at Isandlwana developed a learning programme on sanitation as his Portfolio of Evidence task for his accredited training. This training was funded by the D.G. Murray Trust. The school is supported by the David Rattray Foundation, too. Mr. Seete of Dikgatlong Secondary School developed a creative programme based on his “Economics” curriculum for his task. He is a participant in the N. Cape programme funded by AfriSam.

The Delta Park Dog-walkers continue to support conservation projects in the park, because they are passionate about it. Geoff Lockwood has drawn them into the meeting with representatives of Joburg City Parks to ensure that projects are better co-ordinated.

Several groups of learners and adults (for example, the office staff of the International Union for Conservation of Nature – IUCN, including their Director, Hastings Chikoko) have participated in “Hack Attacks” in the Florence Bloom Bird Sanctuary under Geoff Lockwood’s supervision, supported by Elias Chunga and Mandla Mncube.

DEC’s Recycling “drop-off” area continues to be well-supported. NAMPAC, The Glass Recycling Company, Collect-a-Can, Tetrapak and the Recycling Action Group/Plastics Federation of S.A. must be thanked for their support. The collection of plastics became problematic during the latter part of 2009. The original green cage was removed and a “new and improved” timber-plastic cage is anticipated. The effective collection of Tetrapak containers also needs to be addressed in 2010. We acknowledge the generous donation of 150 clipboards to DEC from Tetrapak during the course of the year.

Several schools continue to perform well in the Eco-Schools Programme in Gauteng and Limpopo. Monde and Brakpan Primary School in Ekurhuleni were awarded “Blue Flags” in recognition for flying “Green Flags” for five consecutive years. DEC is particularly proud of their sustained achievements.

DEC supported the “Earth Hour” Campaign on 28 March 2009 by promoting this WWF initiative amongst staff and programme participants.

The DEC staff participated in the “67 Minutes” Mandela campaign (17/7/09) by building a “Tower Garden” at the Centre as a teaching tool for our programmes. This was a collective effort – collecting bamboo poles, soil, ash and compost, planting an assortment of vegetables and flowers and adding the essential ingredient – water. Many schools and community groups have copied this approach to economical and space-saving food gardening.

DEC invited Simon Gear to give a talk as part of an on-going series of such events, aimed at making the public more aware of the work being done at the Centre, on “Going Green – individual action for a greener world” on Sunday 20 September. A lively presentation with lots of interaction between the guest speaker and the audience was enjoyed by all.

The Centre received a “Highly Commended” award at the Mail & Guardian’s “Greening the Future” awards function on 10 September, in the non-profit organisation category. The winning entry in this category was WWF-SA for their “Earth Hour” Campaign.

Di Beeton attended the Waste Summit hosted by PIKITUP on 9 September. This was of particular interest because PIKITUP continue to consult with DEC on their proposed education programme linked to their “Clean City, Clean Game” campaign.

Di Beeton was invited by the Katlehong School’s Principal’s Forum to make the keynote address at their annual seminar on 7 October. The address was titled “The role of the Principal in creating a positive learning environment at school”. Ms. Nozuko Mathanyela, the Principal of Monde Primary School, serves on the Forum’s Organising Committee.

Di Beeton also represented DEC at the meeting hosted by the Dept. of Environmental Affairs to revive and re-establish a national Environmental Learning Forum (ELF) on 30 September.

Conference delegates, totaling 3372 made use of DEC’s facilities during this review period. Sandy Gracie and her team (Enos Maredi, Elias Chunga, Mandla Mncube and Albertina Bobotyana) give good service to our clients.

Geoff Lockwood and Ivan Ginsberg have been contracted to complete several consultancy tasks in 2009 linked to ecological or ornithological surveys/reports.

6. EDUCATION and TRAINING

2009 proved to be yet another busy year for DEC.

A total of 3370 learners drawn from 58 schools participated in DEC School programmes and 17 574 learners participated in Rand Water's "Water Wise" workshops. The overall total is 20 944.

Several new programmes for different Grades were developed, trialled and implemented during 2009 and they have certainly "added value" to the variety and scope of our work. DEC staff have been thoroughly trained on the programmes, too. Some examples are "Habitats" for the Foundation Phase, "Wild Animals in Towns and Cities" for the Intermediate Phase and programmes on "Biodiversity" and "Classification of Plants and Animals" for the FET Phase. (Gd 10/11)

Some comments from teachers who have accompanied school groups follow:

- Duvha Park Primary School, 19/08/09, "Animal and Plant Ecology"- "One of the best trips I have done this year with the learners. Exactly what we need! We will be back! Thanks!"
- Lekang Primary School, 23/03/09, "Animals and Habitats" - "The information was good and most informative. Learners enjoyed the tour"
- St. Martins, 08/06/09, "World of Insects" - Once again, an outstanding programme in which the pupils have learnt a tremendous amount. Thank you!"

Well done to Jana Cauldwell and her team of part-time Education officers who go the "extra mile" to make groups feel welcome and to enjoy the programmes.

Rand Water's Water Wise team travel far and wide presenting their "Road Show" and other programmes. The MAZDA Wildlife Fund Bakkie affords them the opportunity to do this. A challenging programme for FET learners on "Acid Mine Drainage" has been developed and will be rolled out with vigour in 2010.

DEC continues to offer both accredited and non-accredited courses and programmes to educators, youth groups, environmental education practitioners etc.

The total number of participants in these programmes is 4865.

The training has not only been offered in Gauteng. Accredited Short Course training and non-accredited teacher development programmes were presented in the N. Cape, North West, Mpumalanga, KZNatal and Limpopo provinces. The response from the educators has been gratifying and many examples of good learning programmes and sustainable "action" projects have been implemented. These programmes are funded by the National Lottery, AfriSam, UEMP and the D.G. Murray Trust.

DEC was approached by WESSA to partner them in the facilitation and assessment of a Learnership programme in Environmental Education, Training and Development Practice (EETDP) that has been funded by the Dept. of Environmental Affairs. Presha Ramsarup has been assigned as a Facilitator for the Learnership and Shanu Misser, Vivian Legodi, Hilda Fourie and Paul Lawrence have been assigned as Assessors for the programme. The first 2 modules were completed in 2009.

Non-accredited training for selected teachers in Limpopo and Gauteng at nominated project schools has continued in 2009. The Limpopo schools in the Bochum area held a very successful "Curriculum EXPO" in November to celebrate their achievements.

This training has been funded by the Tony & Lisette Lewis Foundation, Rand Merchant Bank Fund and BHP Billiton.

7. SUSTAINABLE ENVIRONMENTAL PRACTICES

DEC is attempting to present its reporting in a manner that reflects its commitment to sustainable environmental practices. Its sustainability report, based on the Global Reporting Initiative (GRI) reporting framework (latest version is called the G3) will give an assessment of DEC's commitment, strategy and management approach.

Some principles that assist an organisation to achieve sustainable development are:

- dealing transparently and systematically with risk, uncertainty and irreversibility;
- ensuring appropriate valuation, appreciation and restoration of nature;
- integrating environmental, social, human and economic goals in policies and activities;
- equal opportunity and community participation/sustainable community;
- conservation of biodiversity and ecological integrity;
- ensuring intergenerational equity;
- recognizing the global integration of localities; and
- a commitment to best practice and good governance (Source: "Transient Caretakers", King with Lessidrenska, 2009)

This Annual Review is simply a summary/overview of 2009 – the Annual Report prepared for the period 1 April 2009 to 31 March 2010 will attempt to report in a meaningful way on the above-mentioned principles so that strengths and weaknesses can be identified and any appropriate adjustments made.
